One Year Later...



Successfully moved out of the program into permanent housing with his daughter. Still working and attending college. Saved over \$1000, paid off fines and purchased a vehicle.







Was diagnosed with cancer shortly after leaving TH. Passed away earlier this year.





WOW!

There are still two months left in 2015 as this newsletter goes to print, but volunteers have already contributed a whopping 1,225 hours to various LCCH projects and events. And we know that is a conservative total, because it does not include our Board of Directors (who meet monthly), or those loyal, can-do-anything folks (that’s you Doug!) who show up whenever anything needs to be done but don’t always get counted. It doesn’t include those who spend who-knows- how-many-hours to organize others and donate items for the good of our clients, either. Here is a breakdown of the 2015 volunteer hours we have counted to date:

- Volunteer Income Tax Assistance – 724 hours
- Granville Farmers Market Coffee Booth – 190 hours
- Facilities, Maintenance – 187 hours
- Events – 92 hours
- Donation Management – 32 hours

So from everyone at LCCH to everyone of you who has contributed to that impressive total, thank you for your effort, your enthusiasm and your support. It has been a pleasure to work with you this year.

The Need for Housing Assistance Remains High

November has ended and we have wrapped-up another National Homeless Awareness Month. In this issue of our newsletter you can read accounts of the 3rd Annual Home Run and the 2015 LCCH Annual Meeting. We are increasing our social media presence, and tried to be especially visible in November. But have we raised awareness? Do people realize that there is still tremendous unmet need in Licking County?

Unfortunately, despite what is generally seen as an improving economy, staff members with LCCH's Project Homeline program (homeless prevention and rapid re-housing) are seeing an increase in both the number and the dollar amount of requests for assistance, with a considerable gap between what is requested and what we are able to provide (see charts). The number of households on the waiting list for LCCH's Transitional Housing has also increased recently, despite shorter stays by Transitional Housing participants.

Some trends that our Project Homeline staff has identified are:

Lack of Affordable Housing

- The 2015 Fair Market Rent for a two bedroom apartment in Licking County is \$811.00 plus utilities and \$1046.00 for a 3 bedroom rental unit. Local rental housing costs are rising more quickly than wages.
- Housing and utilities require a much larger percentage of many household budgets than the recommended 40-50%, making saving for emergencies almost impossible.

Underemployment

- High employment through temporary employment agencies does not assure employment longevity or provide employees with benefits. Inconsistent weekly work hours make it difficult to budget.
- Additional deductions from pay by some employers (i.e. bus fare, meals, shoe and clothing rental) and charges for using pay cards (i.e. user's fees or transaction fees) rather than traditional direct deposit or paychecks often results in low net pay.

Stringent Rental Requirements, High move-in costs

- Surety Bonds are now being requested by some apartment complexes in addition to security deposit and first month's rent.
- Landlords are charging double security deposit amounts if an applicant's credit score is not acceptable.
- Some landlords are looking back 10-12 years on background checks. People should not be discriminated against in seeking housing if they have had a non-violent offence, it was not repetitive, it has been longer than 10 years ago, and they have paid their debt to society. They should receive the same consideration that anyone else would.

Absent parents

- Retirees need assistance to afford the additional housing and living expenses of raising their grandchildren.



First-time Requests

- If clients have never needed help before, they tend to wait longer before requesting assistance. Unfortunately, delays result in much larger requests for funding for rent or utilities, often far more than may be available.

Licking County has always been a caring community. Many agencies strive to ensure that community needs are managed to the best of their abilities. However, there are still very real needs that are not being met. The question is...how do we get there from here? The answer is...with your help! Yes, additional funding is a huge part of equaling out the requested vs. provided gap. But so are collaboration and volunteerism and awareness...not just in November.

“Right now I have 15 families and 25 single adults on the waiting list, with four intakes being processed. I don't believe I have ever seen this many families on our list. It is a little concerning that the waiting list is this long already and we are not even into cold weather. Usually, the waiting list goes up with colder weather, because people are no longer able to live outside.”

Deborah Tegtmeier Celebrates 20 years at LCCH

Licking County Coalition for Housing (LCCH) was founded in 1992 by a coalition of churches, social service agencies, local government, business and volunteers. In February of 1993, the first family moved into Transitional Housing on North Fourth Street (the apartments are still used today for Transitional Housing). In 1995, HUD awarded a \$1.8 million three year grant and Deb Tegtmeier was hired as Executive Director.

Deb Tegtmeier is a lifelong resident of Granville and an alumna of Granville High School. After her high school graduation, Deb attended Bucknell University where she received her BA in economics. She now has nearly 30 years of government and non-profit organization management, fund development, marketing, program conceptualization, development and implementation experience with business and community development projects. Early in her career she spent several years with the Ohio Department of Development as a business development specialist, obtaining certifications in Economic and Housing Development Finance. She also served as Grant Writer and Fiscal Officer for the City of Newark’s Community Development Division.

Deb has served on the Granville Village Council and the Granville Township Open Space Committee. She presently serves on the Granville Community Foundation Board of Directors, and is Chair of the Granville Area Chamber of Commerce. She is a member of the Rotary Club of Newark. Appointed by the Licking County Commissioners several years ago, Deb also serves on the Licking County Dept. of Job & Family Services Planning Committee.

It is quite evident, through her many years of experience and dedication, that Deborah Tegtmeier has always had the best interest of her community at heart. Thank you for all of your hard work Deb and here’s to the next 20 years...

Young Runners Do Well at Home Run

The weather was perfect, attendance was up and the runners were fast at the Third Annual Home Run 5K, held Saturday November 7th at Rotary Park in Newark. Over 60 runners and walkers, ranging in age from 9 to 73 came out to show their support for LCCH and those who need housing assistance.

With several quick, young runners leading the pack, Ryan Meadows from Trinway, OH, age 14, was the first to cross the finish line in just 17:29. The first place female, Emma Glass, age 15, and a cross country runner for Newark Catholic, finished in fourteenth place overall, with a time of 25:14. There were some impressive runners in other divisions as well. Placing 8th overall was the men's 50-59 first place medal winner Don Charlton, and 17th overall was the men's 60+ first place medal winner Chuck Shepard. Women's 30-39 first place medalist Michelle Newman-Brady finished right behind Glass in 15th place. See box, below for a list of all the medalists! LCCH Prepares for Income Tax Season

Most folks are thinking about the holidays this time of year and income taxes won't enter your head until January. But at LCCH we are (frantically!?) preparing for the 2016 tax filing season. Once again, LCCH will be offering FREE income tax preparation through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. As the name implies, IRS-certified volunteers help taxpayers by preparing and e-filing federal, state and school district returns. Most taxpayers with an Adjusted Gross Income of \$54,000 or less are eligible for VITA services. (Personal income taxes only, no farm, business or rental income allowed. If your tax return includes self-employment income, restrictions apply. Some tax issues are out-of-scope for VITA. Please call for more information.)

LCCH has operated a VITA site since 2006, with four Licking County locations planned for 2016. (See the

box at right for times and locations). We have increased our hours this year, to accommodate the high demand early in the filing season, and anticipate preparing 975 returns between January 28 and April 14th. Clients should call for an appointment AFTER they have received their W-2s and tax documents. A Social Security card or document and photo ID is required. Both spouses are required for a joint return.

If you always prepare your own taxes, think about volunteering for VITA. Training materials are in and it's not too late to get certified. Volunteers must pass an IRS test, and commit to approximately 5 hours per week during the filing season. For more information, contact Kathy Scott at kscott@lcchousing.org or 740-345-1970 ext. 229. Another Successful Year Serving Veterans and Their Families!

September 30th marked the end to another successful year of serving veterans and their families with the Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) grant. LCCH served 95 veteran households (186 people) which exceeded our goal of 90 households. 53 of the households served were homeless and 42 of the households served were at risk of becoming homeless. Our case managers provided each of the 95 households with intense

case management. Some households received Security Deposit, Rent, Utility, or General Housing Stability assistance. We cannot thank our partners enough for helping us to make this another successful grant year.

On September 14, 2015 the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs announced the funding for the coming year, and we are happy to say that LCCH was once again funded to provide

this program for Licking County. SSVF eligibility criteria includes: member of household having served in military, being homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness, and meeting income guidelines. If you think you may qualify, contact LCCH and an SSVF Case Manager will assess your housing situation. To all our veterans, we thank you for serving our country.

Boy Scout Wraps up Supply Drive

Will Rigsby, Eagle Scout candidate from BSA troop 151 in Hebron organized a supply drive for furniture, household items and cleaning products for LCCH, culminating in a drop-off event at the LDS Church in Reynoldsburg on October 17th. Rigsby solicited donations through social media, placed collection boxes at local businesses and arranged for collection of monetary donations and furniture items.

They were able to fill our truck, and also deliver 82 bottles, cans and containers of various cleaning supplies. The items collected will be used by LCCH clients across all of our Transitional Housing and Homeless Prevention programs. Thanks Will, for your compassion and your effort. And we congratulate you on your advancement to Eagle Scout.
